Everyday Sacredness

I've been thinking lately about how God makes the ordinary sacred.

Jesus was sitting and teaching his disciples, and he wanted to make a point about not being too concerned over material things. Looking around he noticed some flowers. "Consider the lilies of the field," he said. (If he had lived in Bethesda, he might have said, "Consider the dandelions.") "They don't toil, and yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are." Humans root out and destroy these plants, but Jesus saw that they surpassed the appearance of a king of fabulous wealth.

At the Last Supper, Jesus didn't require his followers to remember him through feasts of complex dishes full of marvelous ingredients. Instead,

he took the humblest elements, bread and wine—the items that were on every table, accessible to every person—and said, "Take and eat this in remembrance of me." Today the Eucharist—the most sacred rite of the Church—still depends on these same humble elements. Mere bread and ordinary wine; and yet what grace they bring us as we share them in community.

This leads me to two reflections. First, maybe in God's eyes there is no "ordinary." Perhaps everything in God's creation has a sacredness that we should be more careful to see and glory in. The little wren or chipmunk in the back yard; the mushrooms sprouting up all over the lawn in this wet season; maybe even manufactured items like the everyday plate and glass that hold our lunch; and certainly the food that nourishes us. I'm not sure we could stand a constant awareness of so much sacredness around us, but even a glimmer would bring us closer to God.

My second reflection is related to the first. I feel that I'm a rather ordinary person, of rather ordinary intelligence, talents, and accomplishments. But what if, in the eyes of the God who makes a crust of bread a feast for the ages, there is no "ordinary"? What if God sees each *person* as a unique and precious jewel? If that's God's opinion, can I view other people as any less? Can I even think of myself as any less? I think maybe God calls us to recognize and respond to the sacredness in ourselves and in others. It's a calling for a lifetime.

St. Luke's helps us live into this calling. In this community we learn about God, work together to discern how God wants us to live, and support and accompany each other in this process. But to keep any community running smoothly, there's also business to conduct—which we generally do through our Annual Meeting. This year's Annual Church Business Meeting will follow the 10 am service on Sunday, November 18 (there will be arrangements for children). We will thank departing Vestry members, elect new ones, discuss the state of the parish, and consider some plans for the future. Then we'll adjourn to Ludlum Hall to enjoy our annual Harvest Lunch together.

Please plan to attend the Annual Meeting. We want to hear your voice in our deliberations, and our community won't be complete without each of you.







We will celebrate the Saints of God that we were blessed to know personally and we will remember and honor those who are buried in our memorial garden.

Each person in the memorial garden—and each person who the participants in the service want to remember—will get a small area designated to them which everyone will help decorate.

We will say prayers of thanksgivings, share Eucharist, and enjoy tacos together! This will be a service of joyful remembering and honoring.

Example: I'll bring a picture of my friend Adam whom I want to remember. If I didn't have a picture, I could draw one or I could just write his name and decorate it. And then I will place it with the others and everyone will work together to make sure that EVERYONE who is being remembered gets lots of fun decorations and flowers and candles and maybe even some Halloween candy placed around their picture or name.

Samaritan Ministry Christmas Party

St. Luke's will again be gathering Christmas presents for participants, and their families, who attend the Samaritan Ministry Christmas parties. There will be three separate parties, one in southeast, one in northeast, and one in Northern Virginia, serving at least 300 participants and family members. The deadline for bringing presents to St. Luke's is **Sunday, December 2 before 12 noon**. Please look for the Christmas tree in the foyer of the church around November 17th. Please take a tag from the tree and bring back an <u>un</u>wrapped gift matching the gender and age listed on the tag. Gift cards will be given to 13 – 17-year olds in place of gifts. So far this year, Samaritan Ministry has served 1,252 individuals, including 830 *Next Step Program* participants across five locations. **More than 350 participants are new this year**. Participants have achieved over 200 employment-related goals, including 42 participants who completed STRIVE job-readiness training. Samaritan Ministry has also served 422 persons through activities like providing one-time food assistance, providing referrals, supporting those who live with HIV, or assisting those who bury a loved one who was HIV+. Family Church

Recently at a meeting to discuss the book *Faith at Home*, Jessica asked the parents in attendance to introduce themselves. In addition to sharing our names, she challenged us to share parenting wins and parenting fails. If you're like me, the latter comes to mind most readily. For me it's not so much a specific moment of failure as it is an ongoing struggle to live with intention amidst a very crowded and busy family life. This feels especially true as it pertains to my role in my children's spiritual formation. But I did name two practices our family has adopted that when viewed from a distance I think I can claim as a win. The first started as an effort to assuage my guilt (I was raised Catholic) at not getting to church as regularly as I would like, but has actually turned into something special. On these no-church Sundays, we began having "family church" after dinner. I borrowed (stole) the whole thing from Children's Church at St. Luke's (minus the Whirl videos of the colorful children with no arms). The process looks something like this:

- If you have one, light a candle.
- Designate who will do what part—opening mantra, Bible reading, writing prayers, saying prayers. We like to mix it up and make sure everyone has a part.
- Begin with the call and response mantra. Be still and know that I am God (repeat). Be still and know that I am (repeat). Be still and know (repeat). Be still (repeat). Be (repeat).
- Read a story from a children's Bible. We use the Spark Bible, which also includes some
 questions that can be asked to further ponder the meaning of the story and how it is relevant today. We let the kids pick the stories. In our house that has resulted in a lot of stories about Moses. (Incidentally, our prayer at mealtimes is often in Hebrew thanks to our
 years at a Jewish preschool.)
- Take turns sharing prayers of thanks and prayers of help for people or things that are sick, sad, or hurting. We write these on a small pad of paper and then keep our prayers tucked in our Bible.

Once everyone has suggested at least one prayer, then have someone say them aloud in prayer form. This concludes family church! (Don't forget to blow out the candle.)

Since beginning this tradition of family church, we have also begun using Sunday dinners to consider prayer themes for the week. Everyone writes down something to pray about. We fold these



papers and put them in an ordinary Tupperware container (no need to impress God with a fancy bowl). One of the kids then chooses a prayer from the container at random and as a family we agree we will try to include the topic in our prayers throughout the week. Prayers for animals and people in warring countries seem to make the list a lot. It's all an experiment and I'm sure we are not alone. I would love to hear what others are doing to bring some semblance of Holy to the home. Please share!

Budget Analysis: We continue to have a surplus of income over expenses for the year, currently equal to \$59,689. This is due to income being high because of advance payments, while expenses are below a straight-line estimate. All financial obligations for the year to date have been met and bills paid. The Bridge Fund balance is approximately \$70,000. We also received \$10,000 designated for the Endowment Fund. Your continued financial support will allow the growth and energy of St. Luke's to continue and strengthen.

If you need to be reimbursed for a purchase or need the Treasurer to pay an invoice, please obtain a Payment Request Form from the Office. An authorized person must sign the request. All requests for extra money or donations by committees, individuals or church members, should have prior approval of the Vestry before solicitation.
