Last month, I so enjoyed writing an *ACTS* article that didn't mention the pandemic at all. This month, I'm going to write about it again—because it seems like it's not going anywhere anytime soon.

First of all, the bad news. Many people are already feeling very isolated. The shorter days and cold weather that are on the way are probably just going to make that worse. Please go ahead and start making a plan for winter with pandemic. Find a fun project to dive into. Find an online class to take. Make sure you have the proper clothes so that you can still get outside even when it gets cold. And think of who you will commit to check in on during these colder, darker months. While it is still warm enough, meet on porches or patios to do tech support for friends, family members or neighbors and make sure they have what they need to stay socially, emotionally, and mentally engaged. If you have resisted online classes, book groups and game nights because technology isn't your thing—do

reality check. Can you continue on for four-six more months like this? Is it time to change your approach? Much of this is only for a season, but it is a substantial season. Make adjustments as necessary.

The good news: there are blessings in this season. Find them! At church, one of the blessings of this season is that our pets that like to stay home can come to our St. Francis Day Pet Blessing this year. We can have gerbils and cats and fish and guinea pigs in addition to dogs. And we can have skittish dogs, exuberant dogs, and dogs that don't like other dogs. Folks who are allergic to dogs will be able to watch and enjoy this service that is so important to the St. Luke's community.

What's a personal blessing for you in all of this? I heard from someone that they were looking forward to their quiet, small, no-travel Thanksgiving that they would never choose for themselves. Your Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas plans may not look like you want them to look or how they have looked in the past. Fall and winter traditions may have to lie fallow for a year. What opportunities do those losses make possible?

I'm not trying to diminish the losses. There is much to grieve, and I hope you'll give yourself permission and space and grace to do that grieving. Looking for the blessings doesn't mean glossing over the losses. Our Christian belief in resurrection doesn't negate the pain of death, but it does give us permission and freedom to look for the good in the midst of the bad. My Next Adventure

Sometime last winter, Jessica and I started talking about whether I would consider a second term as senior warden. The answer was not clear to me. With a full-time job. I have felt stretched thin at times. But I've loved the experience and every minute of the time I've spent with Jessica and the Vestry.

As I began carefully weighing these personal factors, I also weighed the pros and cons for St. Luke's. My predecessor, Pat Rogers, had served two terms. Did that mean I should do the same? Other people who head committees at St. Luke's seem to do it for a long time. Is two years long enough to have accomplished anything? Have I lived up to everyone's ex-

pectations for a senior warden, yet? I also considered Jessica's journey as a rector. Was it better for her to experience her first four years as a rector with one senior warden's style and priorities, or might it be better for her to get used to adapting to the shifting lay leadership of a church?

In the end, I decided not to serve another two years. While my decision is based on a combination of factors, the message I want to send to you all is that there are lots of ways to do ministry at St. Luke's, and you don't have to do it like the people that came before you. I am serving the length of time that works for me. The shape of my role as senior warden was different than Pat's and will be different than the next senior warden. How I connected with Jessica and what I chose to focus on during the past two years is a product of the unique chemistry between Jessica and me. The next leader will build their own chemistry with Jessica and the Vestry and together they will offer amazing gifts in their shared ministry to St. Luke's.

This model applies across all of St. Luke's ministries—from the finance committee to coffee hour coordinators. I hope you won't be intimidated about trying something new or stepping into a leadership position because of expectations. Each of us gets to define our own way of ministering at St. Luke's and gets to create our own chemistry in whatever role we choose. Those of us who are current leaders need to actively invite people into these ministries and create the space for them to offer their unique gifts and build their own chemistry. Requests for volunteers to perform a set of tasks can be transformed into invitations to share in ministry together.

The best part about stepping away from the senior warden job is that I get to pick my next adventure at St. Luke's. I miss the kids immensely...maybe I'll return to teaching Children's Church. I also miss my Altar Guild duties and will embrace the chance to serve in that ministry when we can be in the building again. Maybe I'll try something I've never done before...ushering, worship council, community engagement committee.

We will celebrate St. Luke's Sunday this month on October 18. That is the day that we highlight and celebrate the many ministries of St. Luke's. I hope you'll join me that day in exploring what your next adventure at St. Luke's will be.

Changing Hymnody

Over the last several years, we as a congregation have expanded our hymnody beyond the familiar comforts of the *Hymnal 1982* to include both older and newer sources. Many of the newer hymns have, through modern texts, helped us proclaim our expansive, inclusive vision of God's love that can sometimes feel bigger than the language our parents and grandparents may have used. We have included more contemporary sources to allow us to more fully express our community's belief that all are welcome and reflect our commitment to the dignity of all persons. I wanted to give you a brief update on the changes that will come to some of this more modern hymnody beginning this fall.

During the summer, reports were published detailing egregious and predatory behavior by David Haas, a composer whose vast catalogue of liturgical music spans several decades and dozens of



hymnals. Haas' works include songs that have become St. Luke's standards over the last few years such as "We Are Called" and the Gloria that we have used at Easter. In light of this information, we will be letting go of his hymns in favor of works by other composers. This will mean not only losing some of our now-familiar congregational songs but also introducing a fair amount of new music in the months to come. I believe it is important for our community to join with other parishes across the country in sending the clear message that no person's work is so indispensable as to excuse or permit predatory behavior. I look forward to introducing you to so many of the other bright, talented, vibrant musicians writing for worship today, and I can't wait to hear what may become your new favorite hymn!

So What Else...?

In response to the economic fallout from the pandemic, St Luke's will be making donations to SO WHAT ELSE...CAN WE DO TO HELP? In addition to Bethesda Help, SO WHAT ELSE accepts nonperishables for distribution to families in need. The most useful donations are pasta, rice, pasta sauce,



beans, canned tuna, soups, cereals, healthy snacks, fruit juice, and milk boxes. They are also in need of baby diapers of any size.

SO WHAT ELSE is a local organization, based in Baltimore, with a Rockville branch. SO WHAT ELSE has provided afterschool programming for kids in need. However, during the pandemic they have begun to respond to the food insecurity that many families confront. They run a food pantry and make drop offs to families in Rockville, Gaithersburg, and Silver Spring who cannot get to the distribution site.

Cornerstone Montgomery's Virtual Champions & Legacies Celebration Wednesday, October 21st @ 7 PM



Nearly 50 years ago, concerned St. Luke's parishioners founded what is now Cornerstone Montgomery—the largest, most comprehensive mental and behavioral health organization in Montgomery County. Today, Cornerstone serves 2,400 adults and transition-age youth and manages 88 properties (including the one adjacent to church) The staff and volunteers believe that every human deserves the right to live and work in their community—even those with mental health and substance abuse disorders. To that end, Cornerstone provides crisis services, housing, vocational support, and many other services. At the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, St. Luke's parishioners provided 125 masks, as well as numerous books, games, and activities (via their Amazon Wish List), to help occupy the residents during the shelter-in-place orders. And as part of the church's ongoing support, St. Luke's has always had a full table at prior Celebrations.

This year's annual 'Champions & Legacies' celebration will be virtual and all are invited to join and contribute! The 2020 Legacy Award Honoree is Maryland Lt. Governor Boyd Rutherford for his advocacy on behalf of behavioral health. Employer, Partner and Volunteer of the Year Awards will also be presented to employers and individuals who have gone above and beyond to support Cornerstone's mission. Proceeds from the Celebration will support Cornerstone Montgomery's Vocational Program, which helps more than 700 adults and transition aged youth—who are recovering from mental health disorders, to choose, find, and keep employment.
